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Come play at Seattle Opera's Family Day **Oct. 22 performance of *The Barber of Seville***

SEATTLE – Start Halloween early by joining Seattle Opera for its [Family Day](#) presentation of *The Barber of Seville*. Everyone is invited to come in their costume for this Oct. 22 performance, where students age 18 and under get \$15 tickets for almost any seat.* During intermission, see how many hair-raising styles you and your family can imagine. We'll get creative with arts and crafts as we draw, color, and cut out silly hairstyles!

During the performance, kids and kids-at-heart will delight in colorful, eye-catching costumes, a spectacular dance finale, and some of the most fun music in all of opera.

"Whether it's a Bugs Bunny cartoon or the opening scene of *Mrs. Doubtfire*, chances are, most everyone has enjoyed the irresistible charm of *Barber* at one point or another," said **General Director Aidan Lang**. "To experience this opera is to understand why its music is often a first choice for Hollywood, and why it's beloved all over the world."

Twenty-three-year-old Gioachino Rossini created this bold, youthful prequel to Mozart's *The Marriage of Figaro* in just a whirlwind 13 days. This is the story of Count Almaviva, who arrives in Seville to search for the mysterious woman—Rosina—whom he met in Madrid. When he learns that she is soon to be married to her tyrannical guardian Bartolo, he enlists the help of the cunning barber Figaro to win her hand. Almaviva and Rosina fall in love, and Rosina turns her mind to duping Bartolo. Told through a parade of hysterical schemes, the opera concludes with an “all is forgiven” finale bubbling over with joy.

The Barber of Seville opens Saturday, Oct. 14, and runs through Saturday, Oct. 28. Tickets are available online at seattleopera.org, by calling 206-389-7676, or in-person at the box office located at 1020 John Street (two blocks west of Fairview).
